Students Take a Stand Against Bullying on Wear Anything Pink Day

Kindness creates culture of belonging at DSBN schools

On February 28, students and staff across the DSBN were decked out in pink attire to take a stand against bullying for Wear Anything Pink Day, which aims to underline the importance of creating a culture of belonging and kindness in our schools.

Grade 8 students at Senator Gibson Public School also participated in The Pink Shirt Project, a new initiative intended to empower youth to make positive change in their communities. Together with the school youth counsellor, Jenna Niceliu, students brainstormed project ideas and decided to focus on kindness - specifically, how kindness affects well-being and one's sense of belonging.

The students displayed great leadership skills in delivering a lesson on kindness to every class in the school. They also came up with the idea of creating a kindness wall made up of bricks designed by students to display what kindness means to them. All 502 students participated! The Grade 8s then created a mural in the school out of all the kindness bricks in an impressive display of unity and community values. Students and staff consistently stop at the kindness wall to observe, read and converse about the messages. It has connected students from Kindergarten to Grade 8 and shows that each individual is valued and that their voice is represented.

Secondary Students Show Off Tech Skills at 26th Annual Competition

Participation highlights strong tech programs in schools

Niagara College played host to the majority of challenges that took place on February 28th during the 26th annual DSBN Technological Skills Challenge. 350 students displayed their skills using industry standard equipment and software while participating in 30 unique challenges. Judging was completed by Niagara College and industry partners, who commented that our students are performing at a level comparable to post-secondary students.



We continue to build partnerships in our community with the Construction Skills challenges taking place at Castle Building and Design Centre in Fonthill. Materials and equipment were donated by Castle and Dewalt, and the judging was completed by the Carpenters Union (UBC Built Local 18) from Hamilton.

Ten DSBN medal winners will compete against nine other school boards in the Skills Ontario Regional Qualifying Competition taking place on Saturday, April 18th at Niagara College. From there, winners will join the rest of team DSBN heading to the Skills Ontario Competition taking place on May 7th at the Toronto Convention Centre. We will have a team of 40 students competing against the best of the best from across Ontario.

Athletics at DSBN Back in Full Swing

Schools demonstrate strong participation and performance

Both Fall and Winter seasons saw participation numbers in elementary schools continue to grow with sports like Junior Rugby and Intermediate Basketball bursting with interest from schools. We also saw several great displays of individual and team success at our District Championship events in Cross Country, Volleyball and Basketball. Countless students set personal bests and many district records were challenged at the final meet in October. From a team perspective, 16 different schools were crowned district champions across various flights and divisions with some securing championships in both Volleyball and Basketball (Wellington Heights & Edith Cavell).

Success at Secondary has been equally as impressive with strong seasons from schools across the board. To date, DSBN teams have won 7 SOSSA Championships and 6 OFSAA Medals including an OFSAA Football Bowl Series Championship (A.N Myer). Individually, students have found success in Cross Country, Swimming and Wrestling with an additional 13 OFSAA Medals, including a Gold in the Women's 50m Backstroke Para Division. As we wrap up our elementary winter season with Junior Basketball and Gymnastics, we are already looking ahead to the launch of our spring season for Elementary and Secondary the week of April 17th.
